
Opens September 4 and runs weekends through September 20.

No matter what, the show must go on. It's practically the mantra of theater.

Noises Off, the hilarious farce, which opens on September 4, celebrates that idea in its rollicking look at the travails of a struggling theater troupe as they gamely strive to put on a show, despite misplaced props, dropped lines, missed cues, missing actors, and unraveling love lives.

It's an idea that hits especially close to home for anyone involved in theater. And, that holds true for the *Noises Off* cast and crew, who have (collectively) well over a hundred years of theater experience, and a long list of nights when Things Went Wrong. Here are a few of their stories:





Edmond Guay, who plays director Lloyd Dallas in VP's production of *Noises Off*, vividly recalls a performance of *Godspell* in which he rushed on-stage to make his Rock-star style entrance, complete with knee-slide, with embarrassing results: "...I started my run too late, and my inertia (I was rather hefty back then) began to take over. I was unable to stop my momentum and proceeded to launch myself off the front of the thrust into the third row of the auditorium. Luckily for me, the box office didn't sell any seats immediately surrounding the platform, so I ended up diving, face-first into the seat."

For Liz Hutchinson (*Belinda, Flavia*) the onstage mishap occurred while she was directing a production of *Thoroughly Modern Millie* and an improperly-closed jail cell door got caught on a batten. "The

tech crew yanked on the ropes and that side of the jail cell broke off from the batten ties and came crashing down, barely missing one of the actresses by about two feet, " she said.



Ross Grossman, an important member of the set construction team, recounts his momentary panic (and quick recovery) when he realized he had come on stage without a crucial prop. "I was in *Crimes of the Heart*, playing Barnett Lloyd. There was a scene where I come in with a damning letter written about Babe that did not help her case. Except I didn't have the letter.

Totally left it on the prop table. Rather than read it, I talk about what *was* in the letter and make the excuse 'It was such an unflattering, derogatory letter, I left it in my safe at the office.'"

VP's Dale Feldpausch, who plays Tim Allgood in the show, remembers his embarrassment when a bench collapsed beneath him during a performance of *Guys and Dolls* in which he played Lieutenant Brannigan. "The audience laughed," he said, "and the gamblers had a lot of fun improvising lines like "clumsy copper," "idiot cop," etc." As for Feldpausch, he calmly got up, "squeezed onto a different bench and the show went on."

NOISES OFF THANKS AVONDALE HIGH SCHOOL with 50/50 Raffle

On opening weekend (September 4—6), Noises Off is hosting a 50-50 raffle to benefit Avondale High School's t heater program. Noises Off rehearsed on the Avondale's stage over the summer on evenings when VP's stage was occupied. Proceeds from the raffle will help send Avondale theater students to the Fringe Festival in Scotland in the summer of 2016.

Board of Trustees News

The BoT is in the process of scheduling long-needed repairs to our roof. The repairs required are extensive and will take several years for completion due to scheduling and financial considerations. The initial repairs (the roof over the stage) are estimated to take five days and will be scheduled for September after the close of Noises Off.

We will probably have some interruption to our parking lot for our lessees to accommodate the roofing company trucks, supplies, and equipment. VP is meeting with the roofing company (Royal Roofing) and our facilities manager (Team Facilities) prior to the start of construction to determine any accommodations that will need to be made.

The BoT will keep members updated on repairs through information posted in the Sunday VP Postings.

The plays under consideration for staged readings include a short farce by Barbara Schmitt on the possible origins of the "Piggly Wiggly" supermarket





Looking Back at Village Players History By Tania Velinsky

As we begin our 93rd season here at Village Players with the hilarious comedy *Noises Off,* I thought this month we would look back at our previous staging of this play.

Village Players first production of *Noises Off* took the stage in March of 1995 and was directed by our very own Mark Carley, who was assisted by the lovely Helen Parrish. The cast included Audra Lord as Dottie, Steve Tadevic as Lloyd, Skip Dietz as Gary, Kristin Bergstrom as Brooke, Deborah Cohen as Poppy, Dave Springer as Freddy, Robin Thomas as Belinda, Larry White as Tim, and Phil Whelan as Selsdon.

According to director Mark Carley, the VP board held a special meeting just to determine if the huge revolving set required by this show was possible on our stage. Tony Kruzman and Paul Hoffmaster came up with a unique design of building the set in 2 separate pieces which created easy manipulation for the "behind the scenes" look of Act II when turning the set around for the "behind the scenes" look in Act II, the walls and the stair unit were able to be manipulated and turned separately. Realizing how interesting it was to watch the set change, Mark decided to leave the curtains open between acts and received applause from the audience every night as the change was completed during each intermission.

Mark was blessed with an extremely talented cast and even noted "Selsdon was played by Phil Whelan, who was quite hard-of-hearing . And of course Selsdon is supposed to be drunk. I am not sure if Phil would appreciate this, but his actual condition provided just the right amount of cluelessness to make the character work perfectly." Mark found this show to be the greatest challenge in his entire directing career given how much of the humor is visual, especially in Act II. For most of the rehearsal period, he had the cast using the auditorium floor as the main playing area, and then had the actors climb up onto the stage to represent the second story of the set. Once the set was completed, he had to work extensively with Skip, who as Gary, was required to fall down the entire flight of stairs. It took a lot of planning and choreography to prevent Skip from injuring himself or from flying into the audience!

Mark believes (and I am sure those who remember this production will agree!) that when done correctly *Noises Off* is THE funniest play ever written, and that the 1995 production at Village Players was very well done. Mark and the rest of us are anxious to see what we are sure will be another very well done production of *Noises Off* over the next three weekends!
